

2015 CAP Families' Parent Engagement Practices



"We offer activities and willing parents come and participate" (Carreon, Drake, Barton p, 2005, p. 469). Educators, staff, and administrators are often quick to measure and define parental involvement. Families from minority, first-generation, low-income and other underserved backgrounds are told they are not complying with the parent involvement rules. Involvement often refers to the participation in an organized event, which includes individual's decision to participate (Carreon, Drake, Barton, 2005). Unfortunately, not many of us take the time to ask parents their valuable insight on education, home activities, and how they define parent engagement beyond the school parameters.

The purpose of this document is to share how College Academy for Parents (CAP) families define or describe "parent engagement". Families describe their engagement practices within the school setting and the home. However, findings also indicate that there is some confusion on what are valuable engagement practices and where do those take place. This document hopes to continue the dialogue on how we can continue to partner, support, respect, and empower families' current engagement practices (home and school activities) in order to enhance academic success and college preparedness.

Parent Involvement: Parent's interactions with schools, teachers and their children's schoolwork as essential to school success (attract parents to school functions, to encourage them to volunteer in their children's classes, and to teach parents how to tutor their children at home) (Valdes, 1996).

- Parent Meetings
- Organized and Planned Events
- Assist with homework
- Power dynamic

Parent/ Family engagement: recognizes families' experiences, culture, language, and formal and informal practices and skills as essential to their child's success. (Kiyama, 2010, Moll, Amanti, Neff, & Gonzalez, 1992).

- Wide range of home activities
- Strong emotional and academic support
- Storytelling and reading
- Mutual respect

Why is this important?

- Parents and guardians from disadvantage backgrounds spend more time on daily home activities than in organized school events (Joan, Walker, Ice, Hoover-Dempsey, 2011).
- Families are key partners and want a better future for their children. Families' voices are often missing in education, and scholarship which means that parental involvement is not inclusive of issues of power and marginalization (Mapp, 2003).
- Redefine parent involvement in order to become more inclusive of the diverse populations and home activities that foster academic success and wellbeing (Valdes, 1996).

Recommendations:

- Create meaningful dialogues with families and build on what they are already doing, ie CAP families.
- Highlight the importance of parent engagement practices in student of the months, district parent councils, parent teacher meetings, and family gatherings.
- District Parent Council meetings can help further the conversation about how to bridge parent involvement and parent/family engagement, family oriented activities, families' needs in conjunction with the school's needs.
- Continue to partner and support parent led and family oriented programs.
