FUNDS OF KNOWLEDGE

- “Those historically accumulated and culturally developed bodies of knowledge and skills essential for household or individual functioning and well-being. As households interact within circles of kinship and friendship, children are “participant-observers” of the exchange of goods, services, and symbolic capital which are part of each household’s functioning” (Gonzalez, Moll, and Amanti, 2005, p. 443).

DEFICIT THINKING PARADIGM

Deficit thinking paradigm overwhelmingly locates the basis of educational (and I would add of social and economic) failure in students, their families, and their cultures (Valencia, 2010).

There exist a series of factors that play a significant role in shaping and reproducing academic failure: School (and neighborhood) segregation; language and cultural exclusion, school financing (and the financial aid system in higher education), school policies, counselor/student interactions, teacher/faculty-student interactions,, curriculum differentiation, and restrictive language and immigration policies (Valencia, 2010).

Challenging More Assumptions and the Transition to College...

□ **Social norms**

- the behavioral expectations and cues within a society or group.
- The rules that a group uses for appropriate and inappropriate values, beliefs, attitudes and behaviors; the established and approved ways of doing things.
- These rules may be explicit or implicit. *Explicit Norms* are written or spoken openly. *Implicit Norms* are not openly stated.
- Normative behavior is behavior consistent with the given norms.
- Failure to follow norms can result in some sort of punishment or negative response, including exclusion from a social group
- **Give example of a social norm? a social norm in schools?**

What is normative in your school?

- Norms are often justified by taken-for-granted assumptions about why things are the way they are.
- In your predominantly Latina/o high school or middle school are there few advanced science or math classes?
- OR are you in a school with a diverse set of students from all races and ethnicities with very few Latina/o students enrolled in higher level math and science?
- What are the taken for granted assumptions justifying why this is the normative set of circumstances...the normative social organization of the school?

- Empowerment [Si se puede]
- Knowledge [conocimiento]
- Resources [recursos]

'Funds of Knowledge' Strategies to Build a Stronger College-Going Culture

- Ask your students to interview a member of their family and share the stories with all your students.
- Bring family members to school and ask them to share their stories.
- Bring community members to school and ask them to share their stories.
